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1. 2026 Annual Campus Safety and Security Report

The University of East-West Medicine (UEWM) prepares this Annual Campus Safety and Security Report to provide current campus-safety policies, procedures, crime statistics, and related information required under applicable federal campus-safety requirements. The report should be read together with the UEWM Student Handbook 2026-2027 and other current University safety policies.

A. Distribution of Policy Information

UEWM publishes the Annual Campus Safety and Security Report on the University website. By October 1 each year, UEWM provides current students and employees with notice of the report's availability, including the website address where the report may be accessed and information on how to request a paper copy.

UEWM's Student Handbook 2026-2027 includes Campus Security and Safety Training. UEWM distributes that training information to students, faculty, and staff at least annually through the University email system and additionally when material changes are made to campus-security or emergency procedures.

UEWM does not maintain on-campus student housing. UEWM does not maintain a sworn law-enforcement department or employ a campus police force. Members of the University community are expected to promptly report crimes, emergencies, suspicious activity, and significant safety concerns.

For immediate emergencies or danger to life or safety, call 911.

B. Campus Crime Reporting

UEWM evaluates reported incidents for inclusion in its campus crime statistics based on whether the incident was reported to a Campus Security Authority or local police, whether it is a reportable offense, and whether it occurred within applicable Clery geography.

Crime information used for the Annual Campus Safety and Security Report may be collected from internal UEWM incident reports and information requested from the Sunnyvale Department of Public Safety. Campus Security Authorities should promptly report reportable incidents so UEWM can meet its crime-statistics, timely-warning, and emergency-notification responsibilities.

D. Policy Statements

UEWM requires prompt reporting of criminal actions and other emergencies. A person should report a significant safety concern even when uncertain whether the conduct constitutes a crime. UEWM reviews reports to determine appropriate response, documentation, notification, and statistical reporting.

E. Timely Warning Notice

UEWM will consider issuing a timely warning when a Clery-reportable crime is reported to a Campus Security Authority or local police and is determined to represent a serious or continuing threat to students or employees. Timely warnings are designed to aid members of the campus community in protecting themselves.

F. Security Awareness and Crime Prevention Programs

UEWM provides Campus Security and Safety Training to students, faculty, and staff. The training addresses crime reporting, emergency response, evacuation, personal safety, sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, bystander safety, hazing awareness, drug and alcohol safety, crime statistics, and the UEWM crime log.

The training is published in the UEWM Student Handbook 2026-2027 and is distributed through the University email system at least annually and additionally when material changes are made to campus-security or emergency procedures.

G. Emergency Notifications and Response Testing

UEWM will provide an emergency notification, without unreasonable delay and taking into account the safety of the community, upon confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation occurring on campus that involves an immediate threat to the health or safety of students or employees.

UEWM's emergency-response and evacuation procedures are to be tested at least annually through an exercise or other appropriate test designed to assess and evaluate emergency plans and capabilities. UEWM documents each test, including the date, time, description, and whether it was announced or unannounced.

H. Emergency Response and Evacuation Policies and Procedures

The President and designated University administrators are responsible for coordinating UEWM's emergency response. Emergency procedures address confirmation of an emergency, notification of the appropriate campus population, evacuation when necessary, and coordination with public emergency responders.

- Remain calm and follow posted exit signs and evacuation routes.
- Follow instructions from UEWM personnel, law enforcement, fire personnel, or other emergency responders.
- Do not re-enter an evacuated building until authorized.
- Assist others only when it can be done safely.

I. Emergency Information

Emergencies may be identified by staff, faculty, students, visitors, public-safety agencies, emergency alert systems, or other reliable sources. Anyone becoming aware of an emergency should call 911 when immediate assistance is needed and notify an available University administrator as soon as safely possible.

J. Emergency Notification

Upon confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat on campus, UEWM will determine the appropriate segment of the campus community to notify, determine the content of the notification, and initiate the notification system unless doing so would compromise efforts to assist a victim or contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.

Notification methods may include University email, text message, classroom or building announcements, alarm systems, or other appropriate communication methods. Additional information may be provided as circumstances develop.

K. Confidential Reporting

UEWM seeks to protect privacy while meeting legal safety and reporting obligations. Crime statistics and timely warnings do not identify victims by name. A request for confidentiality will be considered in light of applicable law and UEWM's responsibility to protect the campus community.

L. Fire Safety and Missing Persons

UEWM does not maintain on-campus student housing. Accordingly, the federal requirements for an annual fire safety report and missing-student notification procedures applicable to institutions with on-campus student housing do not apply to UEWM in the same manner.

UEWM maintains building fire-safety equipment and posted evacuation information in accordance with applicable building and safety requirements. Emergencies should be reported to 911.

M. Emergency Response and Evacuation Testing

UEWM maintains procedures for testing emergency response and evacuation at least annually. Each test is documented with a description of the exercise, date, time, and whether it was announced or unannounced. The purpose is to assess and evaluate emergency plans and capabilities and identify needed improvements.

N. Emergency Action Plan Review and Dissemination

UEWM provides emergency-response and evacuation information through the Student Handbook, this Annual Campus Safety and Security Report, posted evacuation information, and University communications. Students, faculty, and staff are expected to review emergency information and become familiar with posted evacuation routes in areas of campus they use.

O. UEWM Crime Log

UEWM maintains a hard-copy or electronic crime log containing required information regarding reported crimes, including, as applicable, the nature of the crime, the date and time of occurrence, the general location, and the disposition of the complaint, if known. The Campus Security Officer maintains the log; in the absence of the Campus Security Officer, the President maintains it.

Persons seeking access to the crime log may contact UEWM and request to speak with the Campus Security Officer or another appropriate University administrator.

2. Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program

UEWM maintains a Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program (DAAPP) in accordance with applicable federal requirements. The DAAPP is distributed annually to students and employees and to new students and employees who begin after the annual distribution.

A. Standards of Conduct

UEWM prohibits the unlawful possession, use, manufacture, sale, or distribution of illicit drugs or alcohol on University property or as part of University activities. Students and employees must not participate in University activities while impaired in a manner that creates a safety or professional risk.

B. Sanctions

Violations may result in University disciplinary action up to and including dismissal or termination and referral to law enforcement, consistent with University policy and applicable law.

C. Health Risks, Legal Sanctions, and Resources

The DAAPP provides information concerning health risks associated with alcohol and drug misuse, applicable legal sanctions, institutional sanctions, and available counseling, treatment, rehabilitation, and recovery resources.

D. Distribution and Biennial Review

UEWM distributes the DAAPP annually and periodically conducts the federally required biennial review to evaluate program effectiveness and consistency of disciplinary enforcement. The current DAAPP and related biennial-review documentation are maintained separately from this report.

3. Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence and Stalking Policies

A. Institutional Policy

UEWM prohibits sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking. UEWM also prohibits retaliation against a person for making a good-faith report, participating in an applicable University process, requesting supportive measures, or exercising rights protected by law.

UEWM administers Title IX obligations under the federal Title IX regulations currently in effect. Reports involving possible sex discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, or other sexual misconduct should be referred promptly to the UEWM Title IX Coordinator.

C. Reporting and Immediate Safety

A student or employee who experiences or becomes aware of possible sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, sexual harassment, or other sexual misconduct should report the matter promptly through the applicable University reporting process. When immediate danger exists, call 911.

UEWM may assist a reporting person with information concerning law-enforcement reporting, medical care, preservation of evidence, supportive measures, and community resources as appropriate to the circumstances.

D. Definitions and Consent

For Clery Act reporting and policy purposes, UEWM uses the definitions required by applicable federal law and applicable California law for sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, stalking, and consent. The current definitions and procedures are maintained in UEWM's applicable Title IX, VAWA, and campus-safety policies.

E. Supportive Measures and Resources

UEWM will provide information concerning available supportive measures and relevant community resources. Depending on the circumstances and availability, supportive measures may address academic, workplace, safety, or other needs.

F. Institutional Disciplinary Procedures

Allegations of prohibited conduct are handled under the University policy and procedure applicable to the reported conduct. UEWM provides notice and an appropriate opportunity to respond as required by applicable law and University policy. Available sanctions may include warning, probation, suspension, dismissal, termination, loss of privileges, or other appropriate measures.

When required for a disciplinary proceeding arising from dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking, UEWM provides the parties with the procedural rights required by applicable federal law, including applicable notice, advisor, and outcome-notification rights.

G. Bystander Intervention

- Call 911 when there is an immediate threat.
- Seek assistance from other people or University personnel.
- Do not physically intervene when doing so could create additional danger.
- Remain available as a witness when safe to do so.

- Report the incident promptly.

H. Risk Reduction and Prevention Programs

UEWM provides prevention and awareness information addressing sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence, and stalking. Campus Security and Safety Training includes bystander safety, reporting information, personal-safety practices, and referral information. This information is distributed through the Student Handbook and University communications.

I. Sex Offender Registry

Registered sex offender information for California is available through the California Department of Justice Megan's Law website at www.meganslaw.ca.gov. Students and employees may also contact local law enforcement for information available within its jurisdiction.

4. Hazing Prevention, Reporting, and Transparency

UEWM prohibits hazing in connection with any University program, activity, student organization, team, group, or other student affiliation. Hazing concerns should be reported promptly to the Campus Safety Manager, Academic Office, or another appropriate University administrator. When conduct creates an immediate threat to health or safety, call 911.

UEWM provides hazing-awareness information through the Student Handbook and campus-safety training. UEWM maintains and discloses hazing-related information as required by applicable federal law, including the Stop Campus Hazing Act.

UEWM's Campus Hazing Transparency Report is updated when required by law. If there are no findings of responsibility for hazing violations during a reporting period, no new transparency-report entry is required.
